The National Eucharistic Revival

- The National Eucharistic Revival is a 3+ year initiative to renew the Church in the United States.
- It has four phases: Dioceses, Parishes, the Country as a whole and mission.
- The National phase involved the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, which came here to Mater Salvatoris and that I was privileged to help lead.
- The National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, the first since 1941.
- Now the Missionary Phase of the Revival: Walk-With-One and inviting people back to faith.
- But there is obviously meant to be a personal phase for everyone and a familial aspect!



The Eucharist in Family Life

- There are many ways to live the Eucharist in family life.
- The family of Blessed Carlo Acutis
- The family of St. Therese Lisieux
- We see that God can in fact make Eucharistic saints from different starting points. Everything is meant to cooperate with grace.
- But we would like to pass on as of the greatest importance what we ourselves have received.
- Goal is to make Jesus in the Eucharist the source, summit, root and center of the life of the family.



Important Principles

• The Eucharist is a Person not a Thing

- We must treat the Eucharistic Jesus the way we would treat the baby Jesus, the teen Jesus, the adult Jesus, the Jesus on the clouds.
- We must speak about him accurately.
- Children are capable of grasping when we explain to them the mysteries. Maria Montessori: "There is a deep mystery hidden in the Mass...: Jesus, at a certain moment, comes down alive on the altar. He is invisible, but he is truly present because the bread is changed into his Body and the wine into his Blood. We go to to Mass to find Jesus, to receive him. He is present there, He lives and will never leave us. This is our comfort, the greatest part of our faith!"



Important Principles

- Reverence and Wonder
 - A sense of the sacred.
 - Some have said it would be hard to deduce the Real Presence of Jesus by the way most
 Catholics comport themselves before the Blessed Sacrament.
 - Reverence in the body. Genuflection. Hands. Eyes. Then interior.
 - Reverence in our words and way of speaking.
 - Reverence before the tabernacle, after the consecration, in the way we receive, in the way we pass Churches on the street.
 - Reverence begins with love. We cannot teach love without loving.



Important Principles

- The Domestic Church the Family
 - The family is meant to be a "church in miniature," worshipping God, pondering his word, transmitting the faith, treating each other with charity, living in communion, sacrificing for God and others.
 - JP II: The Eucharist is the very source of Christian 0 marriage. The Eucharistic Sacrifice, in fact, represents Christ's covenant of love with the Church, sealed with His blood on the Cross. In this sacrifice of the New and Eternal Covenant, Christian spouses encounter the source from which their own marriage covenant flows, is interiorly structured and continuously renewed. As a representation of Christ's sacrifice of love for the Church, the Eucharist is a fountain of charity. In the Eucharistic gift of charity the Christian family finds the foundation and soul of its "communion" and its "mission." ... Their sharing in the Body of Christ that is "given up" and in His Blood that is "shed" becomes a never-ending source of missionary and apostolic dynamism for the Christian family (FC 57)



- Preparation for the Mass
 - Excitement, rather than stress or excessive obligation. Going to meet God! Encounter Jesus!
 - Teaching them to prayer with reverence at home. Rosary.
 - Help them to understand the prayers, the sacred objects, gestures, symbols, vestments and colors, the various parts of the Mass. Books, videos, explanations.
 - Spiritual communions, perhaps at the end of the prayer after meals.
 - Singing Eucharistic hymns
 - Liturgical preparation of the readings, perhaps prayers.
 - Pray the night before.
 - O Mass kit



- Preparation for the Mass
 - Photos of the Eucharistic Jesus at home. First and subsequent communions.
 - Count down for the first holy communion, in years, months, eventually days.
 - Talk about what it's like to receive Jesus.
 - Care for the Church. Clean. Linens. Candles. Polishing. Grounds.
 - Celebrate anniversaries of first Communion in a big way. Share stories.
 - Learn prayers by heart and discuss them.
 - Retreats in preparation for first communion.
 - Sacrament of Confession!



- Celebration of the Mass
 - Sacrifice, presence and communion
 - Importance of vocabulary
 - How to listen to the Word of God and respond.
 - Perhaps prepare own familial Prayers of the Faithful.
 - "My Lord and my God!" and other aspirations.
 - Altar serving.
 - Thanksgiving during Mass.
 - Mass intentions for family members, living and deceased.



- After and Outside of Mass
 - Take time around the Sunday table to discuss insights and fruits from the Mass.
 - *Epi-ousios*: Perhaps one or more Masses during the week, individually.
 - Become an EMHC to the sick and bring children with you?
 - Invite priests over to the house. Perhaps ask the priest to celebrate Mass in your house once a year and invite others over.
 - Pray for priestly vocations
 - Watch Mass from the Vatican and elsewhere.
 - Foster devotion for the Eucharistic saints.



Practical Tips for Taking Jesus' Real Presence Seriously

- Visits to the Blessed Sacrament
- Adoration
 - Train children how to speak and listen to Jesus
 - Communicate a sense of wonder and awe
 - Big Eucharistic events: Steubenville East, SEEK, Eucharistic Congresses in Diocese or Country.
 - Build up stamina.
- Eucharistic Processions
 - Great way of communicating truth of Real Presence.
 - Adventure for boys, act of love for girls



John Paul II's Encouragement

The Eucharist is truly a wondrous sacrament. In it, Christ 0 has given us himself as food and drink, as a source of saving power. He has left himself to us that we might have life and have it in abundance (cf. In 10:10): ... The life that comes from Christ is a life for us. It is for you, dear husbands and wives, parents and families! Did Jesus not institute the Eucharist in a family-like setting during the Last Supper? ... And he is Emmanuel, God with us, in an even greater way whenever you approach the table of the Eucharist. It can happen, as it did at Emmaus, that he is recognized only in "the breaking of the bread" (cf. Lk 24:35). It may well be that he is knocking at the door for a long time, waiting for it to be opened so that he can enter and eat with us (cf. Rev 3:20). The Last Supper and the words he spoke there contain all the power and wisdom of the sacrifice of the Cross. ... There is no other power and no other wisdom by which you, parents, can educate both your children and yourselves. The educational power of the Eucharist has been proved down the generations and centuries. (Letter to Families 18)



Benedict XVI's Encouragement

0 The Eucharist, as the sacrament of charity, has a particular relationship with the love of man and woman united in marriage. A deeper understanding of this relationship is needed at the present time. ... The Eucharist is the sacrament of our redemption. ... The Eucharist inexhaustibly strengthens the indissoluble unity and love of every Christian marriage. By the power of the sacrament, the marriage bond is intrinsically linked to the eucharistic unity of Christ the Bridegroom and his Bride, the Church (cf. Eph 5:31-32). The mutual consent that husband and wife exchange in Christ, which establishes them as a community of life and love, also has a eucharistic dimension. Indeed, in the theology of Saint Paul, conjugal love is a sacramental sign of Christ's love for his Church, a love culminating in the Cross, the expression of his 'marriage' with humanity and at the same time the origin and heart of the Eucharist. For this reason, the Church manifests her particular spiritual closeness to all those who have built their family on the sacrament of Matrimony. The family - the domestic Church - is a primary sphere of the Church's life, especially because of its decisive role in the Christian education of children.
